Supporting Beacon School was the Reason for Freezin'

Over \$8,000 raised for Beacon PTA

On the day of the event, snow was falling and the temperature was about 25 degrees.

Supt. Kevin Davis said he was appreciative of the turnout at the event.

"We're always looking for fundraisers, and this is a natural opportunity," he said. "We're going to be able to raise a lot of money this morning, but what's more important are all the people that are out here, 25 degrees, wanting to support us, and we're very appreciative of the community support."

Davis came not just to cheer on the participants, but to take the "plunge" himself.

"I'm ready to go and I'm going to go all the way under, I hope," he said beforehand, "and the bigger hope is that I come back out."

Davis managed a full dunk in the lake, and made it back to dry land safely. Around 120 other people showed up and took a plunge that morning. Also there were several volunteers to make the event run smoothly and safely.

"I would like to thank the Albany VFW and the many volunteers who worked so hard to make this event such a huge success," said Director Becky Martin. "I was overwhelmed at the level of support from the community, and appreciate everyone who, despite the freezing weather, came out to support Beacon School."

Johnson said that the plunge was the group's way to give back to the community.


